Climb Mt. Whitney

the Highest Point in the United States

With the completion of the new horse trail up Lone Pine Canyon the round trip from the Owens Valley to the top of Mt. Whitney, the highest point in the United States (elevation 14,502 ft.) may easily be made in four days. Every mile of the trip is filled with interest as the trails pass through a country of rugged and ever changing beauty. A special feature of the trip is that the ascent may be made over one trail and the descent over an entirely different one.

One trail starts from our Carroll Creek Camp and reaches the top of Whitney by way of Cottonwood Lakes, Army Pass, Rock Creek and Crabtree Meadows. The other starts from the mouth of Lone Pine Canyon and follows the course of Lone Pine Creek to its headwaters and thence to the summit, where the trails join.

From the crest of the Sierra a magnificent view may be obtained of the peaks of the Kern-Kaweah range and the Kings-Kern Divide, all in the great watershed of the Kern River.

Parties desiring to travel farther may follow the trails northwards to the East Fork of the Kern and South American Lake. From there the trail may be followed, still northward, over Junction Pass to the Kings River country or, instead, the route into the head waters of the Kern may be followed.

Five-lake basin may be reached by way of Rattle Snake Pass and on to the Giant Forest, or the Kern may be followed for 16 miles down to Lewis Camp, where meals and accommodations may be secured. The return trip is up Golden Trout Creek through Little Whitney Meadows, Tunnell ranger station, Mulkey Meadows to Carroll-Creek.
