THE KITTIE LEE Inn is located at Bishop, Inyo County, bordered by green lawns that invite the wayfarer to rest following his motor trip across the desert or mountains. It is on U. S. Highway 395, known as the Three Flags Highway, 279 miles north of Los Angeles. Giant poplars, offering shelter from summer sun and winter blast, add to the rest and refreshment of the Inn.

The Inn is a most convenient starting point for side trips to numerous canyons and mountain lakes, whose resorts are well known. Many of the beautiful lakes are close at hand and may be reached by short motor trips. Pack trips into the back country also beckon the hunter and fisherman, as well as the person who seeks restful quiet.
