LONE PINE'S unmatched *variety* of attractions makes it the center of a vast wonderland filled with one surprise after another. Vacationing never dulls in this land of stimulating scenery. Within easy reach are Mt. Whitney—highest peak in the U. S. outside Alaska—and Death Valley, lowest point on the continent. Just outside LONE PINE are the grotesquely sculptured rocks of the Alabama Hills, setting for many western movies.

To the west of LONE PINE lies the Sierra Range, its pine-clad slopes laced with gushing streams and dotted with scores of lakes. Here you will find—accessible by car—the native habitat of the prized golden trout. Brook trout and browns abound in the mountain waters. Solitude is yours along well-maintained trails where only people, horses and burros travel.
