

**How to Reach  
Mono County by  
Automobile**

**FROM LOS ANGELES**—Mono county's famous recreational area lies almost due north of Los Angeles and may be reached over the high-speed all-paved state route by way of San Fernando, Mint Canyon, Lancaster, the new bonanza mining region at Mojave, via the Three Flags Highway, U. S. 395, through Inyo county and Lone Pine, Independence and Bishop, entering Mono county a few miles north of Bishop. Here the road by easy grades, enters the high country of Mono. At Tom's Place, a lateral road takes the vacationist to Rock Creek Lakes. Other county roads go to the Owens River Gorge, Hot Creek, the upper reaches of Owens River, and Convict Lake. A secondary state highway taps the beautiful Mammoth Lakes country and another secondary route makes the loop off the main highway by way of June, Gull, Silver and Grant Lakes.

At Leevining the Tioga Pass road into Yosemite Valley joins the Three Flags Highway. Roads also lead off from Mono Lake to Benton, at the northeast edge of the county, and to the storied mining camps of Bodie and vicinity; and also to Lundy Lake region.

From Bridgeport one may drive into Nevada by way of Sweetwater Valley, and north of Bridgeport is Sonora Junction and the Sonora Pass road west into San Joaquin Valley.

**FROM SAN FRANCISCO, Northern and Central California**—The motorist has a choice of several scenic routes, including Tioga Pass road from Yosemite National Park; Sonora Pass road from Sonora and the Mother Lode country; Ebbett's Pass highway into Nevada and thence south into Mono, or by way of beautiful Lake Tahoe or Donner Pass into Nevada and south through Antelope Valley.

**BUS ROUTES**—For those who would prefer to visit Mono County points without driving their own car, daily Inland Stages now operate between Los Angeles and Reno, over the Three Flags Highway. Rates are reasonable.

**RESORTS**—Mono County has many modern, up-to-the-minute resorts located on favorite fishing streams and lakes. Information on any of these resorts may be secured by writing the County Clerk, Mono County, or the Mono County Chamber of Commerce at Bridgeport.

**TOURIST FACILITIES**—Communities in Mono county boast a variety of businesses equipped to care for all needs of tourists and vacationists. Good hotels, stores, camps, garages and similar services may be found at all points. Several pack trains are at your service for trips into the remarkable back country of the county, off the beaten path of usual tourist travel.

**VARIED ATTRACTIONS**—Mono county covers an area of 3030 miles, with an average width of 38 miles and a length of 108 miles, broken by the Sierra range. Its snow-capped summits reach a height of from 12 to 13 thousand feet. Mono Lake is called "The Dead Sea of America", hundreds of mountain lakes are hidden in the canyons, meadows are filled with wildflowers in the spring and summer, old mining camps interest the historian and geologist, and other points make it a country well worth visiting.

**CLIMATIC CONDITIONS**—During summer months the thermometer seldom climbs higher than 85 or 90 degrees, summer showers are frequent and cool breezes from the Sierras temper summer heat. Generally the winter season is severe.
