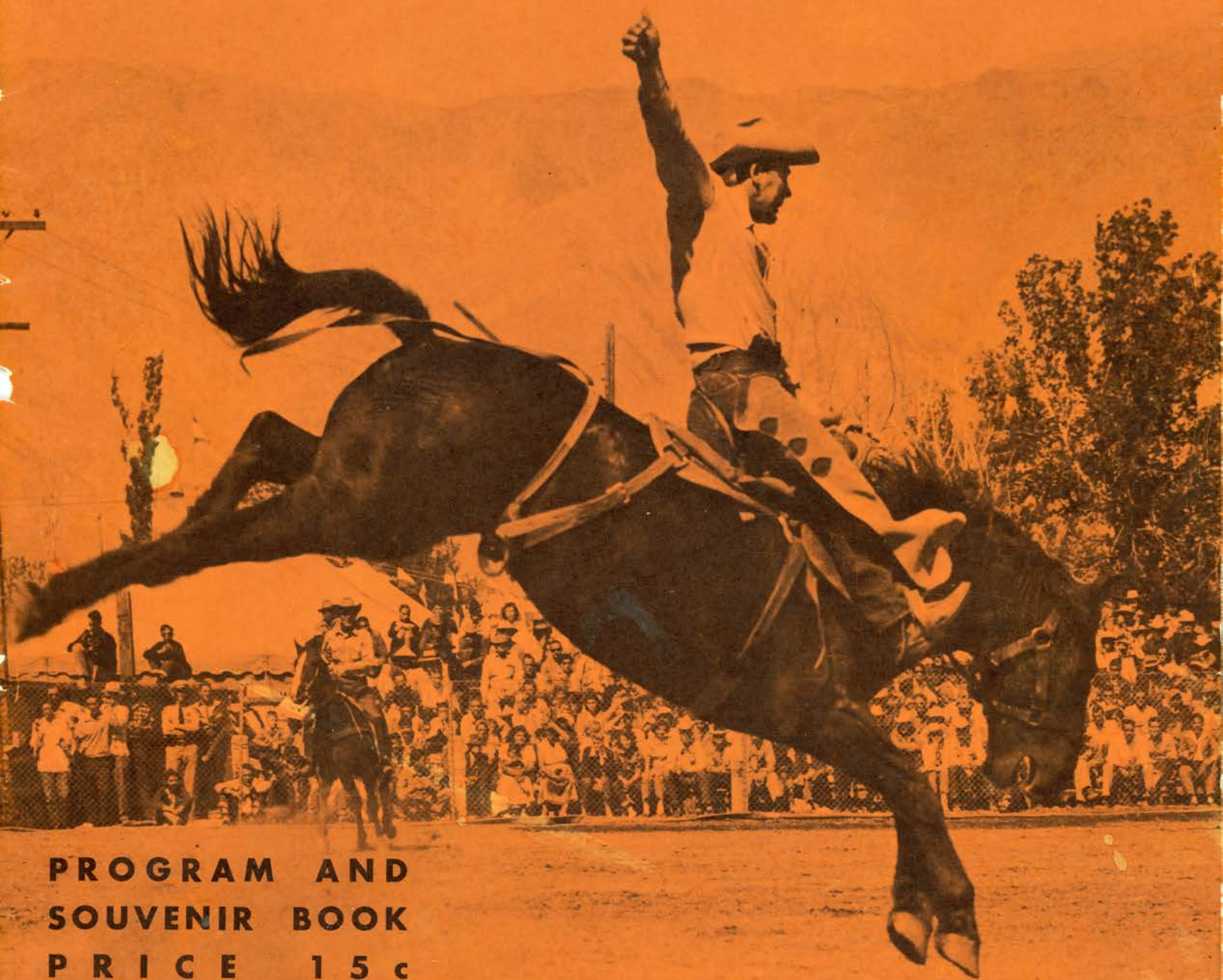

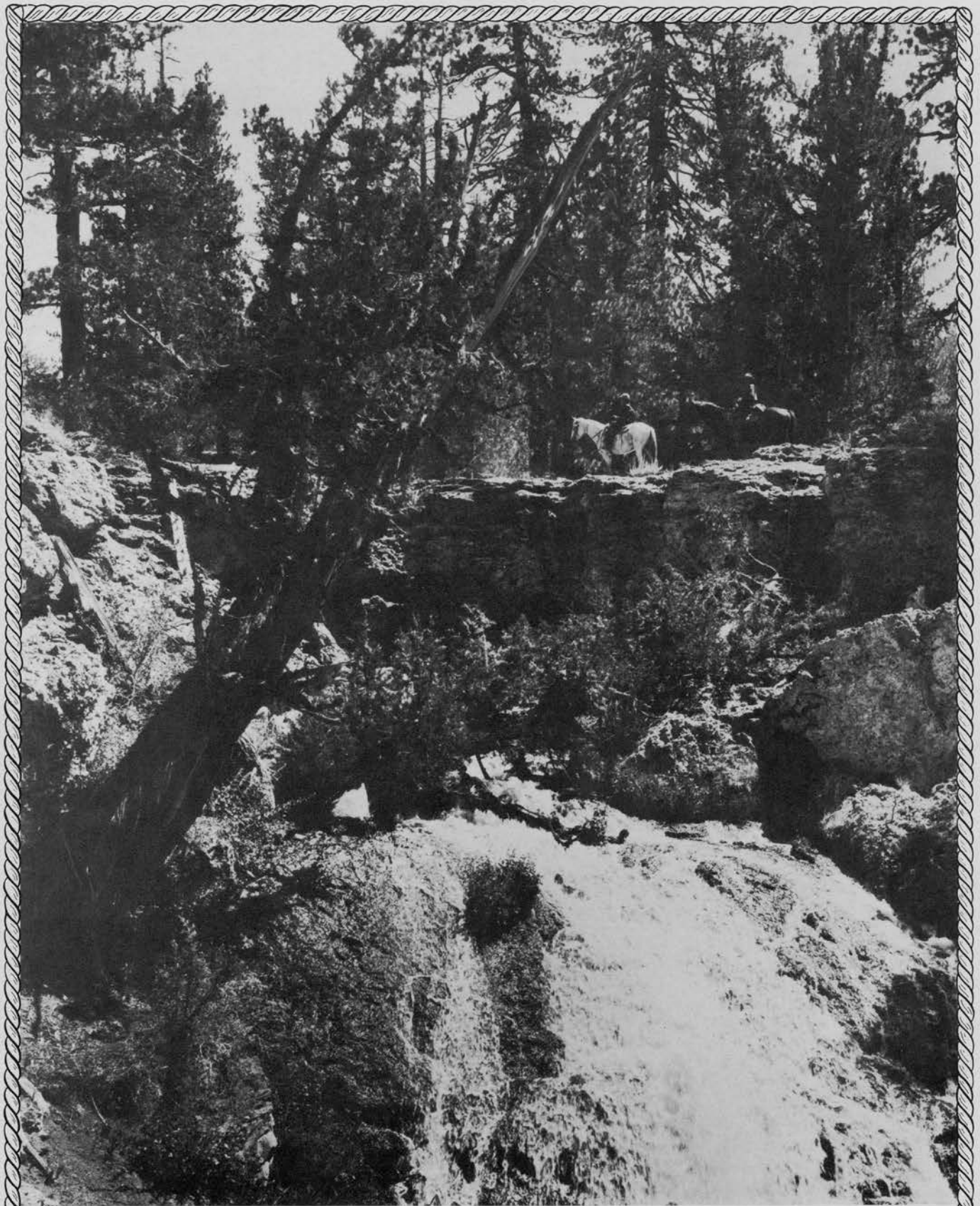

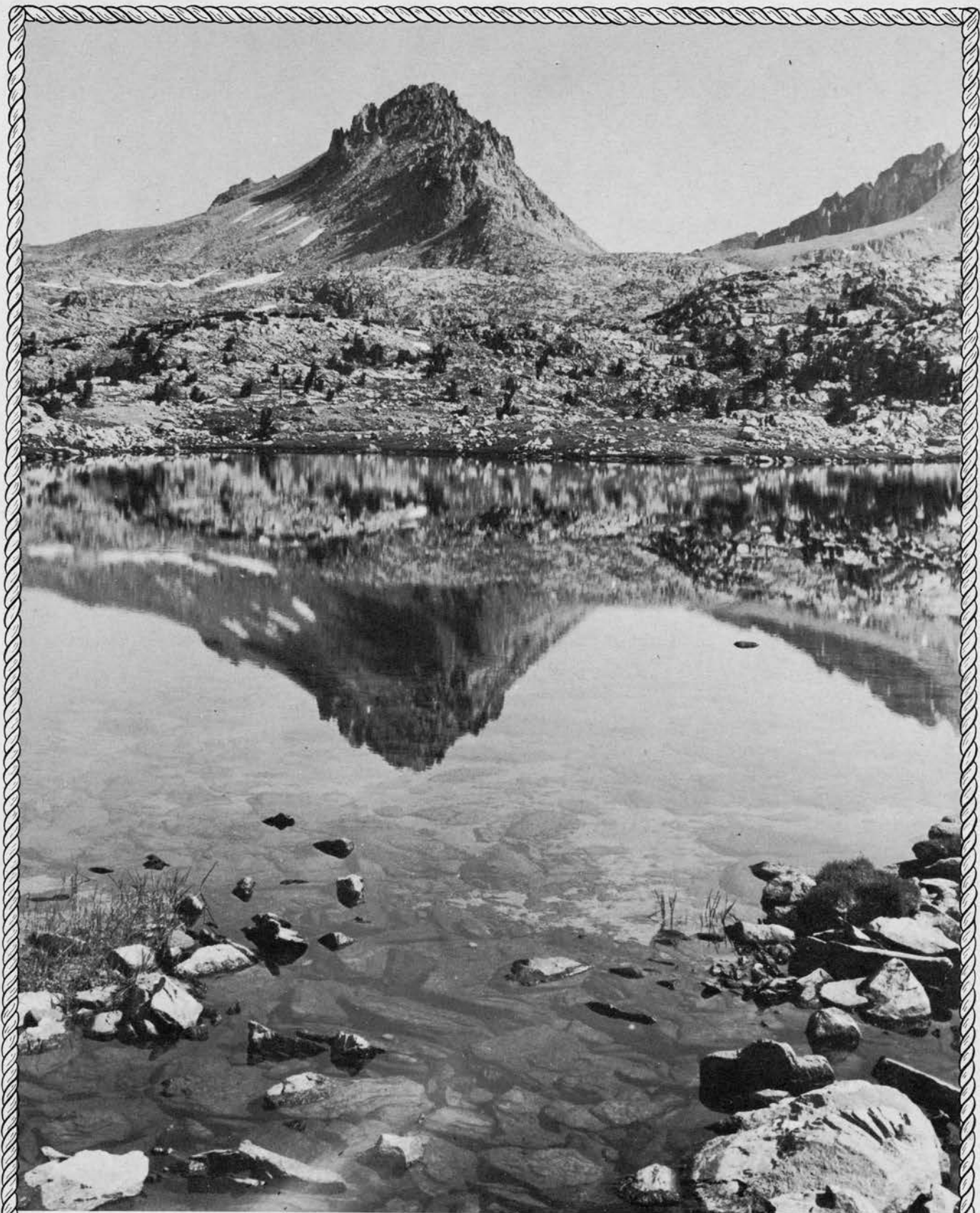

Rodeo Events

BAREBACK BRONC RIDING

Broncs are ridden without saddles; one hand rigging is used. Judges decide on all rigging. Horses are numbered and drawn. Eight seconds is allowed for ride before signal is given by timer. Riders knocked off at chute, or whose horse falls at chute, are entitled to re-ride at judges' discretion.

SADDLE BRONC RIDING

Riding is done with plain halter, one rein and saddle. Riding rein and hand must be on same side. After horse leaves starting place, horse must be spurred first jump out, high in the shoulders, and rider must continue to spur throughout ride. Credit is given for spurring over point of shoulders. Ten seconds is allowed each rider from time horse leaves chute. Ride is completed when signal is given. Rider may not change hands on rein, wrap rein around hand, pull leather or lose stirrup.

BULLDOGGING

Steer must be caught from horse, brought to a stop and twisted down. If steer is accidentally knocked down before being brought to a stop or is thrown by the bulldogger by putting the animal's horns into the ground, it must be let up on all four feet and then thrown. Steer is considered down only when it is lying flat on its side, all four feet and head straight. Each bulldogger has a "hazer," who attempts to keep steer running straight ahead. Ten second penalty for breaking barrier.

CALF ROPING

Time starts when calf passes barrier. Two loops are allowed and calf may be caught in any manner, providing rope goes over the head first. Contestant may adjust rope and reins in a manner that will prevent horse from dragging calf. Rope may be dallied or tied hard and fast. Contestant must dismount, go down rope and throw calf, then cross and tie any three feet. If calf is down when roper reaches it, the calf must be let up and thrown by hand. Tie must hold until passed by judges and roper must not touch calf after giving finish signal. Ten seconds penalty for beating or breaking barrier.

TEAM ROPING

Time starts when steer crosses barrier. One roper must first catch head, half head or horns of steer, and the other must catch both or one hind foot. Each is allowed two loops. If animal falls before second rope is on hind feet, he must be permitted to regain his footing. Both ropes must be on the steer and horses. Catching by head and one front foot disqualifies team.

BRAHMA BULL RIDING

Eight seconds allowed for ride before signal is given by timer. Riding must be done with one hand and loose rope. No knots or hitches to prevent rope from falling off bull when rider leaves him. Rope must have bell under bull's belly. Riders knocked off at chute, or if bull falls, are entitled to a re-ride at judges' discretion. If rope breaks, contestant is entitled to re-ride on same bull. Rider is disqualified if bucked off, not ready when called, touches animal with free hand, or uses sharp spurs.

INYO BRAND OWNERS STEER STOPPING

Inyo County brand owners gather annually at Lone Pine in friendly rivalry for special awards in the steer stopping contest. They say it's a bit tougher in front of a crowd than down in the home corral. Time starts when steer crosses barrier. Contestant is allowed only one loop; steer must be caught by the head.

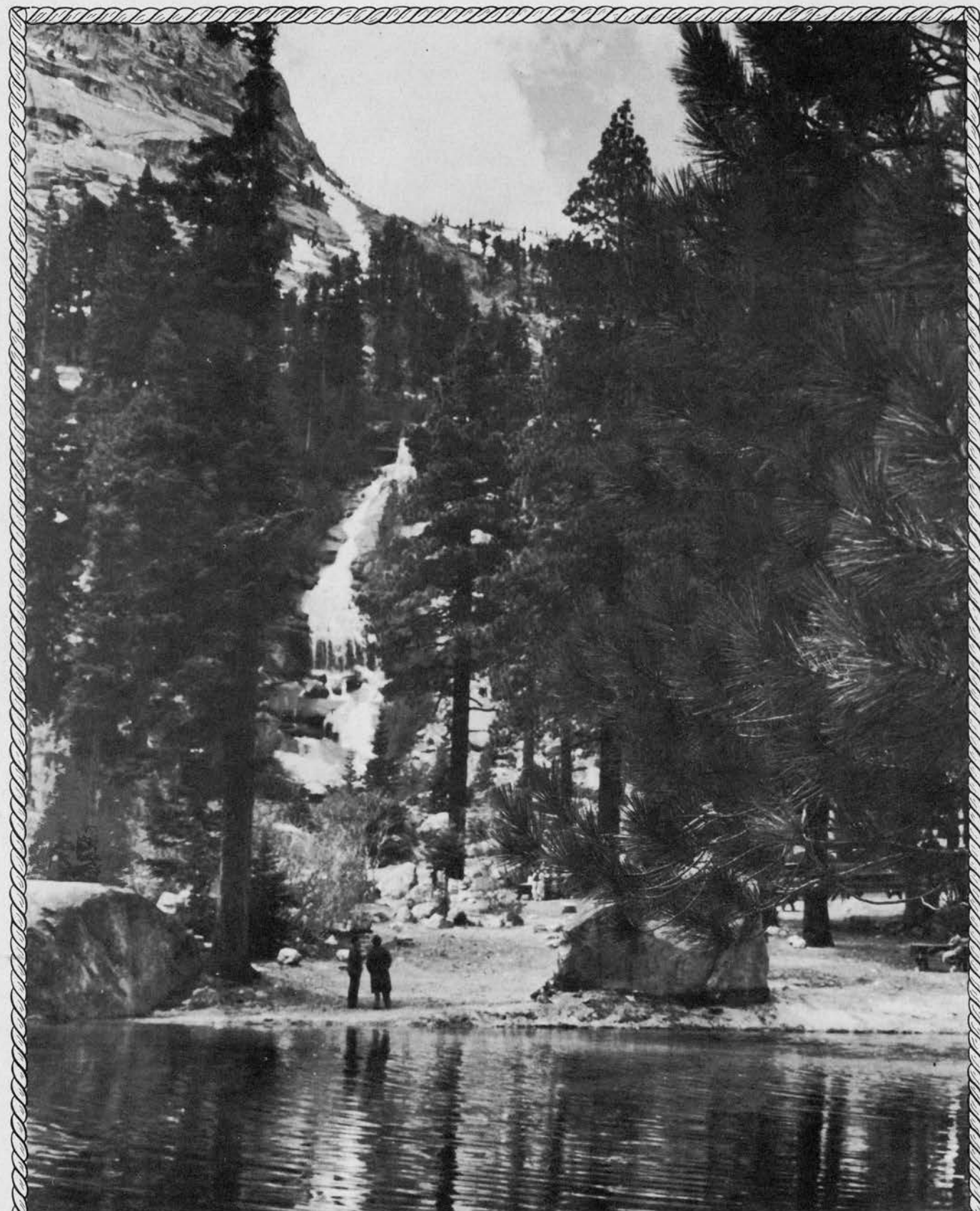

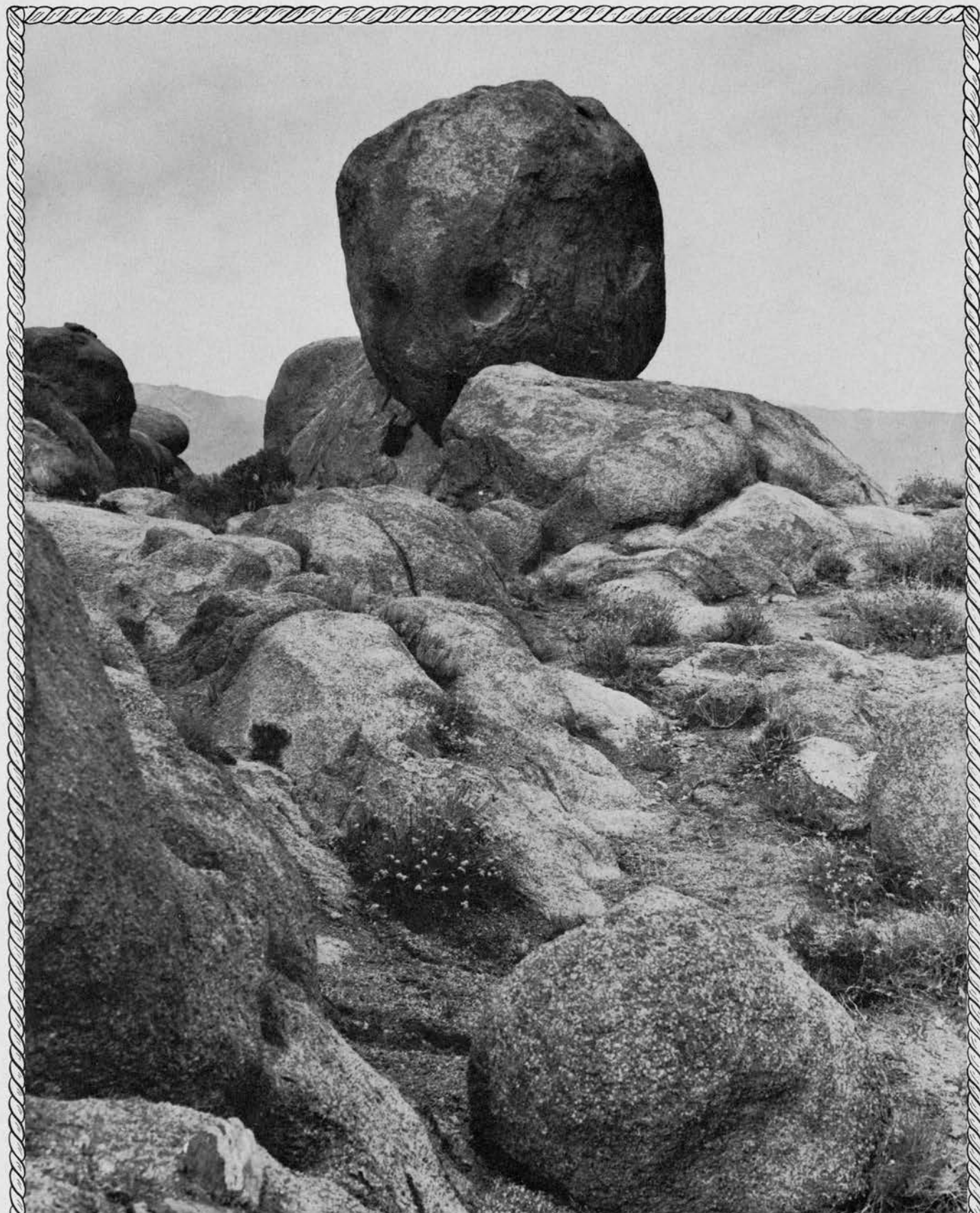

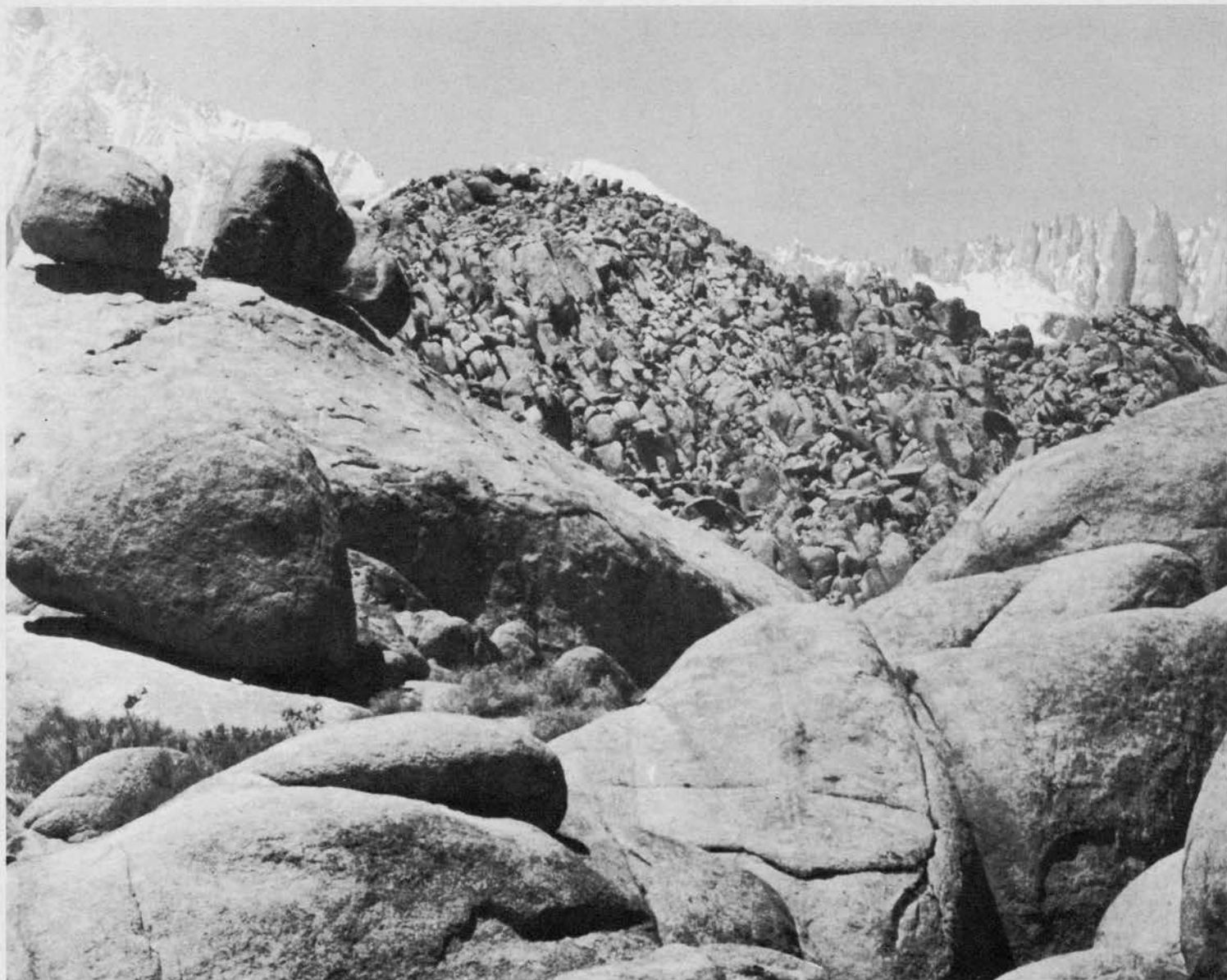

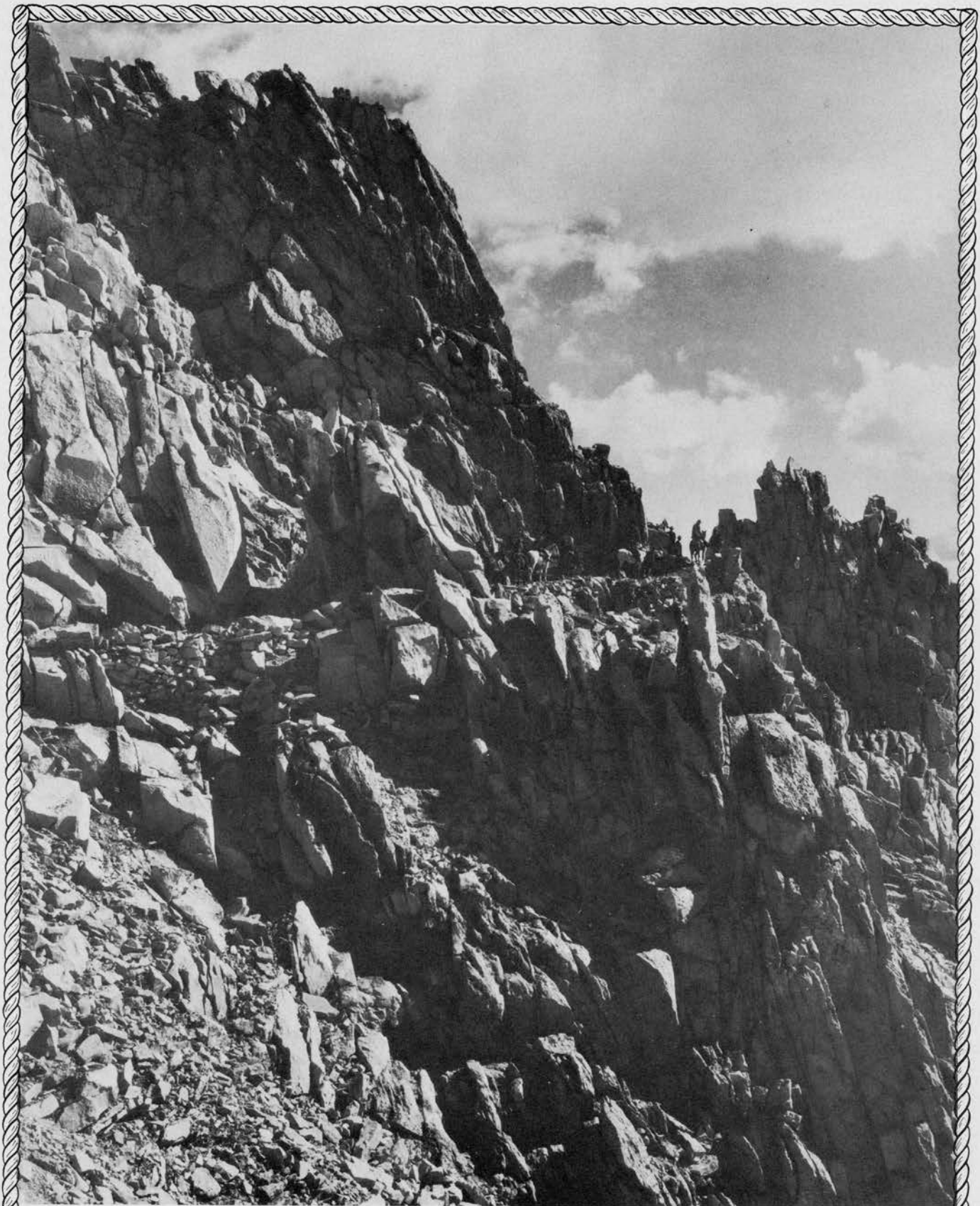

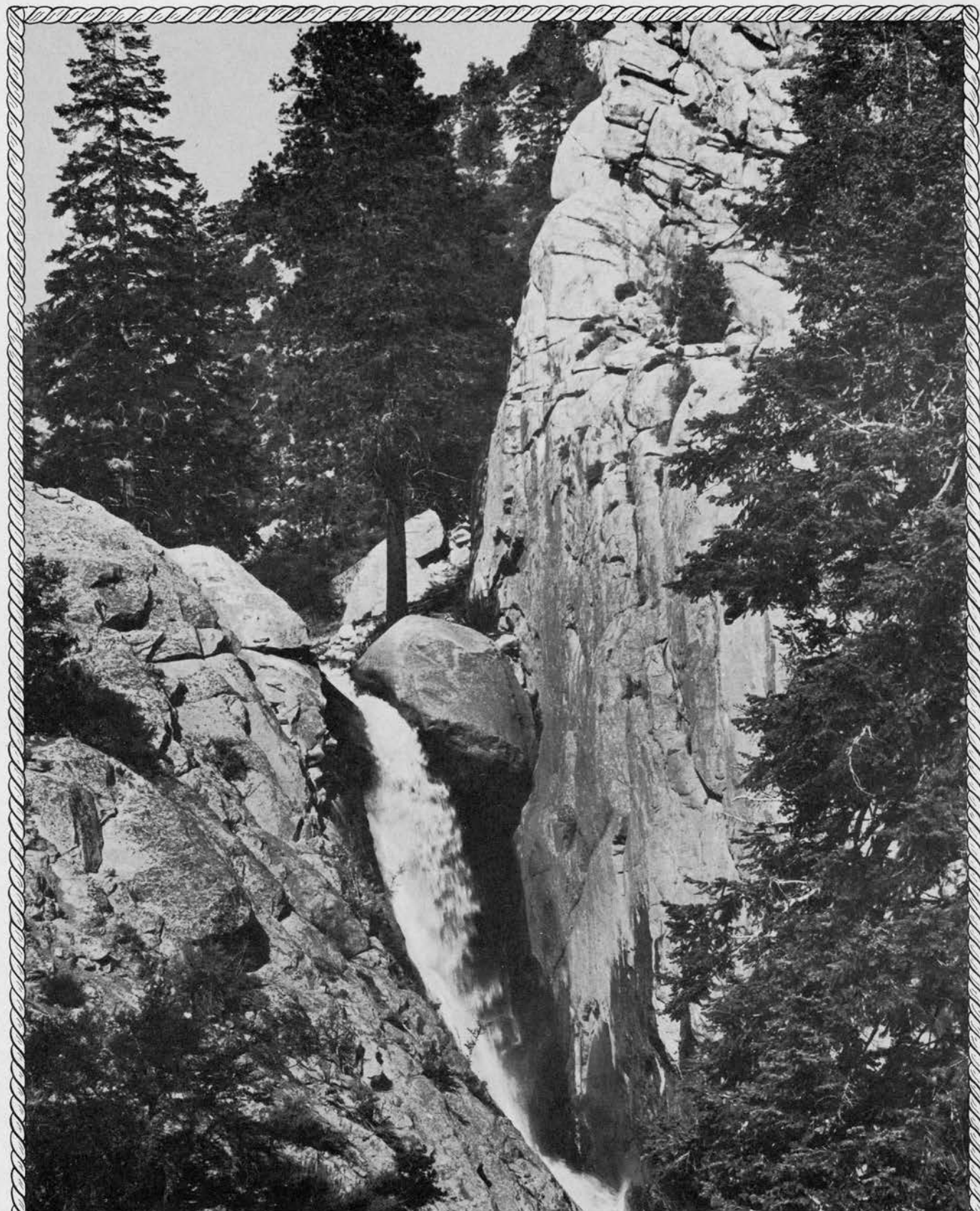


A PACK TRAIN TRAVERSES RUGGED WHITNEY PASS

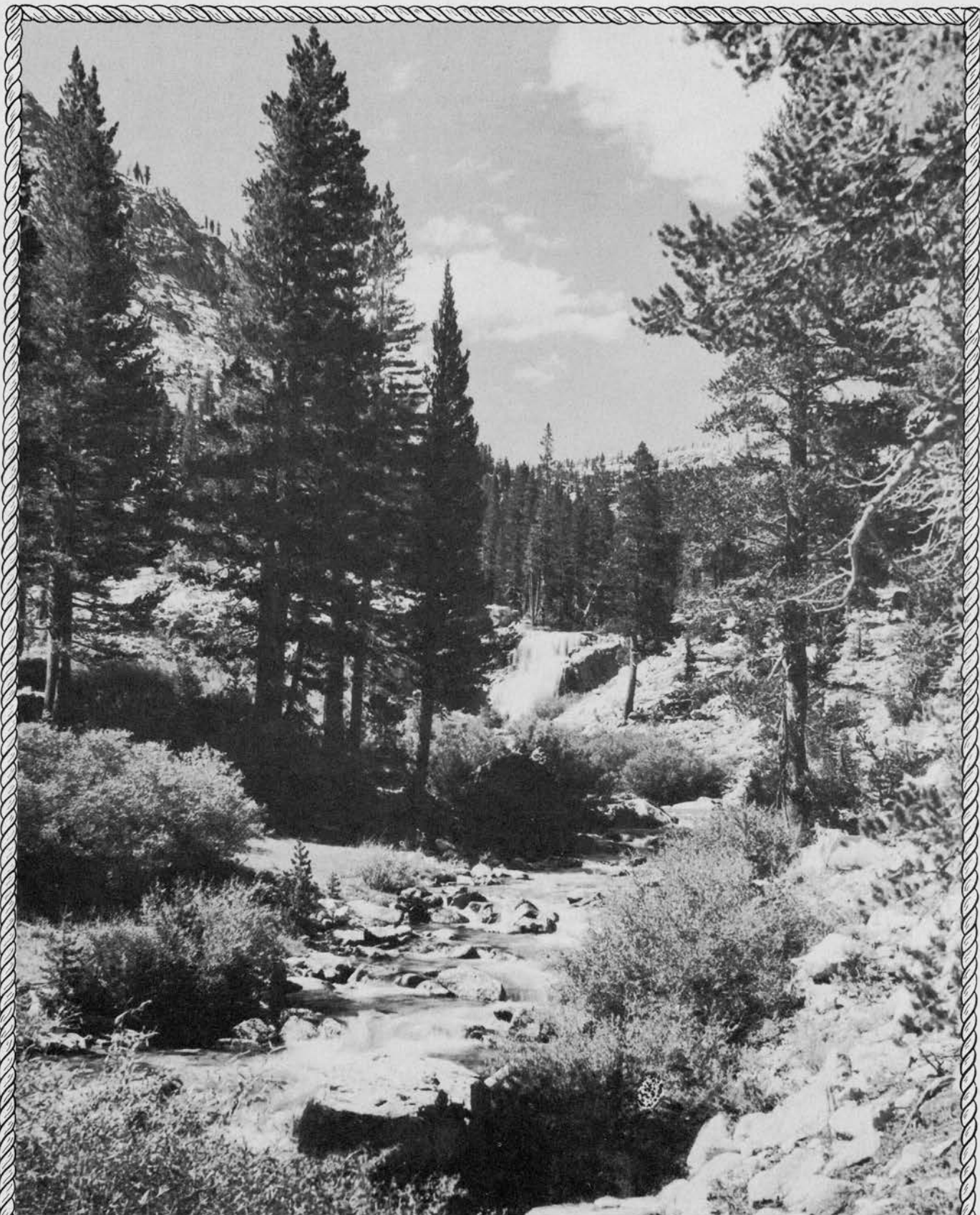


LONE PINE CREEK CASCADES DOWN THE CANYON

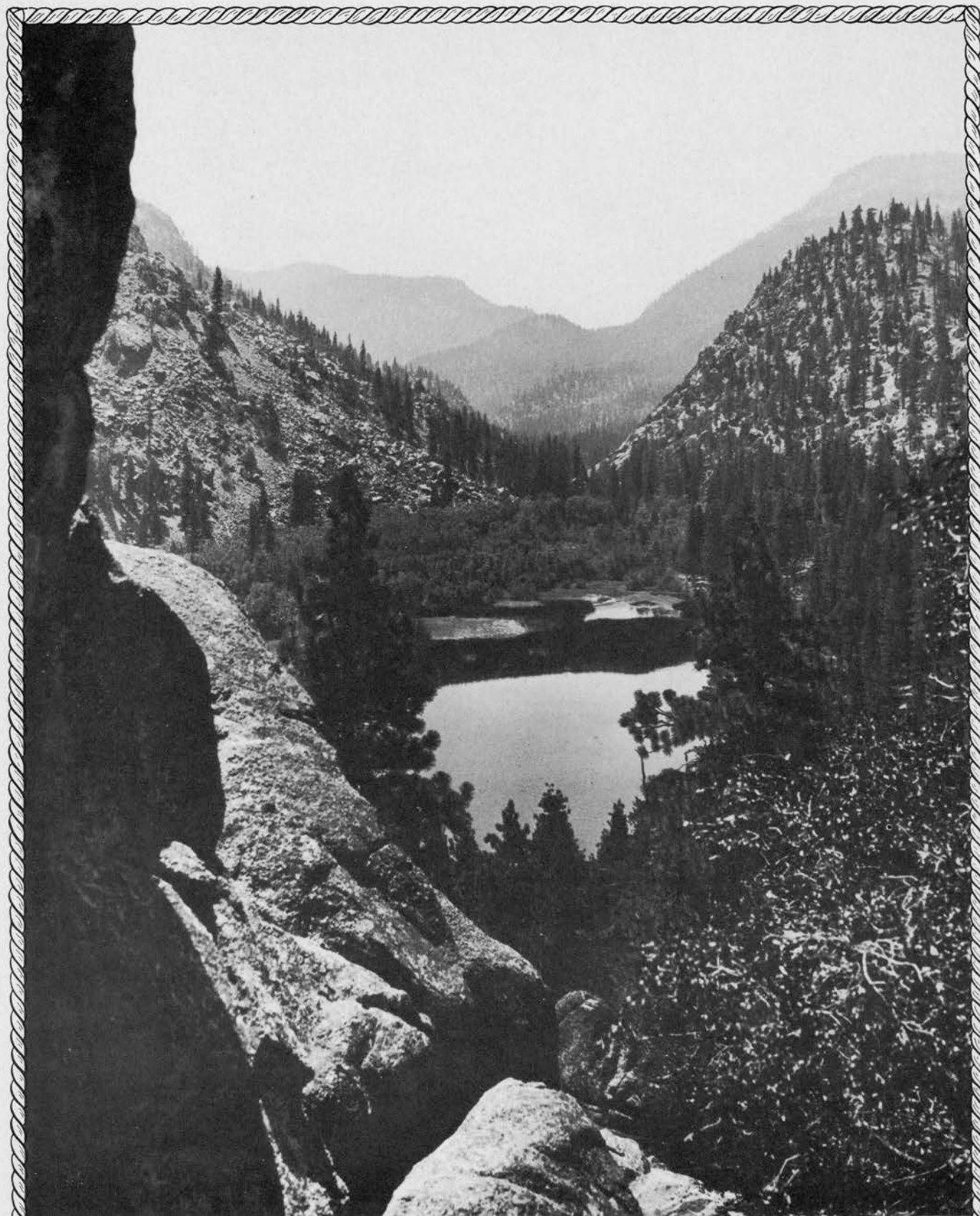

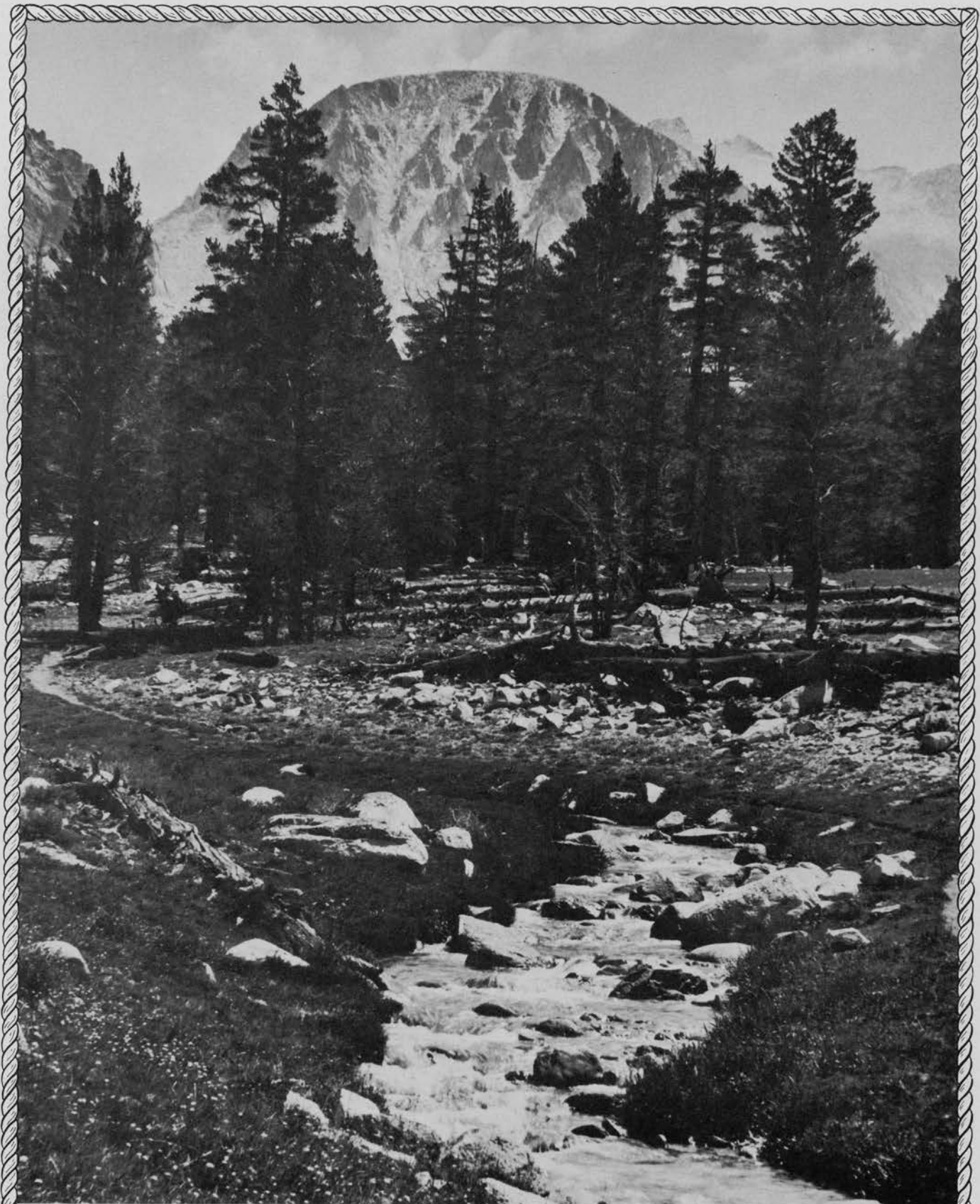
