HOW A CALIFORNIA PIONEER BUILT UP A GREAT INDUSTRY AND BECAME THE "BORAX KING."



In 1872, Mr. F. M. Smith (now the world-famous "Borax King") was running a wood camp in Columbus, Nev., and incidentally prospecting for mines. Tramping about Teel's Marsh, Nev., he saw the surface covered with a heavy incrustation of gleaming crystal-like substance which proved to be Borax, worth at that time 30 cents per pound, and not 3 cents, as many careless of the truth or for the purpose of influencing public opinion, have asserted.

Borax was little known, except to the druggist and blacksmith, and the total annual consumption in the United States at that time was only about 600 tons.

Mr. Smith made a preliminary location, gathered samples and had them assayed. He had chanced upon the richest section of the deposits. However, Borax land is very "spotted" and only a small portion of it sufficiently rich to pay for the working. This location led him to further discoveries, and finally to the great deposits


which is from 125 to 400 feet below the level of the sea, and for 167 miles the road stretches away through the desert, 60 miles of which has to be crossed without a drop of water, with incessant clouds of sand, a burning sun, rugged, precipitous mountains with almost impossible grades, over and through which the Borax had to be hauled to the refinery.

THE BEGINNING OF THE 20-MULE TEAM

To make Borax a commercial possibility, and to present it to the world at a price that would warrant its use, special means of transportation had to be devised.

Ordinary wagons could not stand the strain, nor be made big enough to be profitable—horses were useless, because consuming often more than twice as much water and food as mules, water being scarce and vegetation absent; hence the 20-Mule Teams, the largest wagons in the world, were constructed to stand the tremendous strain of the load—large enough to carry a carload of Borax.

Two wagons there were; 16 feet long, 4 feet wide and 6 feet deep, weighing 7,800 pounds and costing \$1,000 each, with the rear wheels



7 feet in diameter, a tire 8 inches wide, rim 5 inches thick, and in addition to these two wagons, was a water wagon with a barre of iron, as no wooden barrel could stand the intense heat.

To draw this outfit required the services of 20 trained mules, of necessity sound, of the strongest vitality, and

broken to desert work. These mules were driven in pairs of 10, attached to a tug-chain and guided by a single line, 120 feet long, known as a "Jerk" line.


The driver, the celebrated Borax Bill, sat upon the wheel mule, guiding his team with this line in one hand, the other manipulating a strap attached to a brake of tremendous resisting power.

20-MULE TEAM LEAVING DEATH VALLEY


· It has been stated many times (erroneously, however,) that previous to the formation of the Pacific Coast Borax Co. and the discovery of Borax by Mr. Smith, Borax was sold at a much less price than at present, principally owing to the fact that at that time there was no duty laid upon the imported product.

As shown above (and the statement can be easily verified by statistics) at the time of the discovery of Teel's Marsh, the entire consumption of Borax in America was about 600 tons and the retail price, 30 cents per pound.


Now, the consumption of Borax in America in the trades and for domestic use is 20,000 tons, at an average price of about 7 cents per pound.

A tunnel in a borax mine located in Death Valley 125 to 400 feet below the level of the sea. Note the large pile of Colmanite (or crude borax) on the dump.


This is the shape in which it is conveyed to the Refinery by the 20-Mule Teams, there to be refined into pure 20-Mule Team Borax.

AVOID ADULTERATED BORAX

THE HARMLESSNESS OF BORAX

and Boric has been proved again and again by the testimony of the best medical authorities. At the Pure Food hearings before Senator Mason's Committee, several of the leading physicians of Chicago testified to the harmlessness of both Borax and Boric. HOW TO HAVE A CLEAR COMPLEXION

One of the chief needs is to keep the skin clean. With the hard water that is used in large cities, soap alone seldom makes a thorough cleansing agent for the removal of dust and sebaceous matter. Whenever the pores of the skin become clogged with foreign particles, irritation sets in, and unsightly

blemishes are the result. The wise woman will keep a bottle of borax solution (see below) on her dressingtable or washstand, and will consider it as much of a necessity as her supply of clean bath linen.

A Good Complexion Means Good Grooming; good grooming means using soft water. Dirt, grit, and grease will settle in the skin when the face is washed only in hard; cold water and soap, and this alone in time injures the color and softness of it. One should never bathe the face in hard water, if a fair complexion is desired; the water should be softened with a little "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX.

Borax in the water makes the skin lustrous, and possesses the recommendation of ancient favor, as it was in use by the women of Egypt, who extolled

its value for this purpose.

There is no more unsightly, humiliating complexion ailment than blackheads or pimples. The best treatment for blackheads is a simple diet and plenty of outdoor exercise, eating fresh fruit, drinking hot water and taking "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX baths. (For further reference, see page 12.)

Borax Solution for the Toilet Table

Put one ounce of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX in a quart bottle and fill with warm water. After it is dissolved, add more Borax, until the water has absorbed all it can hold in solution.

Use a little of this solution in water night and morning when bathing the face; or at night a teaspoonful of BORAXO (the delight-

ful bath powder), rubbing the skin lightly with a crash face cloth; in the morning a teaspoonful of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX in cold water, dashing the water over the face and slapping the cheeks softly for about five minutes.

Borax Stimulation for Red, Rough, Coarse Skins

Enlarged pores give the skin the appearance of being of coarse texture, sometimes denting into the cuticle until there is a net-work of unsightly little pittings. The remedy is to stimulate the functions of the skin.

Stimulating the skin by steaming will do much toward closing the pores, and the skin can be stimulated by drinking three pints of hot water every day, and bathing the face twice a day with a hot solution of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX: one teaspoonful of Borax to a pint of water (see cut), then bathe or sponge for five or ten minutes, with clear cold water, until the skin is in a fine healthy glow; dry with a soft towel, but



do not rub the skin; too much friction often destroys the delicate and sensitive texture, causing redness, roughness and irritation. After bathing the skin it should be massaged every other night with a small quantity of BORAX COLD CREAM (formula herewith).

"20-Mule-Team" Borax Cold Cream

One ounce of spermaceti; one ounce of white wax; five cunces of best imported oil of sweet almonds; one and one-half ounces of rosewater; half ounce of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX.

Dissolve the Borax in the rosewater, and, if the weather is cold, set the bottle in a pan of moderately warm water. Melt wax and spermaceti, add almond oil, and heat slightly; remove from fire and pour in rosewater quickly. Beat to a foam with an egg-beater. When partially solid, add two drops of oil of rose. Cease beating before the mass is firm. Pour into little porcelain jars and keep in a cool place.

In Massaging the face let all movements be upward and outward; rubbing also inward, so that the under muscles will be stirred and the outer skin not overstretched. The woman who scrubs her face with circular sweeps that draw the cheeks down, will cause the muscles to assume a doleful droop that will be anything but joy-compelling. Careless washing of the face often leaves a harsh surface, as if one's countenance had been starched and dried in a strong wind.

HOW TO HAVE SOFT, WHITE HANDS

THE first step is that the Hands be clean; the second is manicuring. It is absolutely necessary that the hands should be washed in soft water.

Borax makes water soft, and not only whitens the hands, but keeps the nails from getting brittle. Of course you must use Soap - Soap that

while softening and whitening the skin must not contain ingredients that irritate and chap the surface.

Before manicuring, the nails should be soaked at least five minutes in tepid (not hot) water in which BORAXO has been added.

After bathing, very gently press back the cuticle about the finger-nails, using an old soft linen towel. If the cuticle adheres and refuses to disclose the white crescent at the base of the nail, lift it gently with an orange-wood stick, sharpened for the purpose.

Then the nails should be filed slightly oval, never cut into shape. After filing, smooth with fine sandpaper, and the nails cleaned with the orange-wood stick. Last they should be powdered and polished.



HOW TO HAVE LUXURIANT, LUSTROUS HAIR

It is impossible to have the hair healthy and beautiful unless the scalp is free from dandruff.

To have the scalp healthy and clear of dandruff, careful shampooing is most essential. Keep the hair strands clean by frequent brushing, using a brush of firm. fine bristles, which will go through the heaviest locks. Washing the hair once a month is quite sufficient for the average dry hair. If the

hair is oily, twice a month is not too often. To stimulate the scalp and prevent an oily condition of the hair, washing it in water containing a pinch of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX is the most effective treatment.

The hair should be rinsed twice after washing it; if oily, three times; dry thoroughly.

A thorough shampoo with hot water into which a tablespoonful of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX is placed, followed by a

complete rinsing in clear, cold water, will cleanse the scalp, allay itching and irritation, heal any scalp soreness, and make the hair soft, fluffy and beautiful. Try it-you will be surprised and pleased at the result.

Valuable Recipes for the Hair

TONIC FOR VERY DRY HAIR - Bay rum, five ounces: tincture of cantharides, one ounce; olive oil, one ounce; "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC (obtained at any druggist's), twenty grains. Apply with medicine dropper to the scalp, and rub in with a sponge.

SHAMPOO-Two ounces of BORAXO (a delightful bath and toilet powder), two tablespoonfuls of alcohol; beaten yolk of one egg; one pint of warm water. Keep tightly corked. After using tonic or shampooing the head, always rinse thoroughly with clear water,

brushing the hair until the scalp is dry.

SHAMPOO TONIC FOR WHITE HAIR - Take a small bar of white castile soap and dissolve in a quart of boiling water; boil down to one pint; when cool add one pint of bay rum, one tablespoonful of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, thirty grains of bi-sulphate of quinine. Use a tablespoonful or two for each shampoo. Will keep nicely.

To BRIGHTEN BLONDE HAIR—Beat up the yolks of six eggs, rub through hair, then moisten with a bowlful of water to which sufficient "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX has been added to soften the water. Put a pinch of the powdered borax in each rinsing water. When hair is partially dry, sit in the sunshine.

CURLING FLUID—"20-MULE-TEAM" powdered BORAX, one-half ounce; gum arabic, fifteen grains; spirits of camphor, three drams; warm water, eight ounces. Dissolve solids in water, when cool add camphor. Moisten hair with lotion and roll in small ringlets, pinning with invisible hairpins.

Some Beautifying Suggestions

TAN AND SUNBURN—Strong soap and hard water should be particularly avoided. Use only tepid water and the addition of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX Solution (see previous pages) and you will prevent redness, roughness and irritation, and keep the skin cool and clear.

Apply this lotion generously: Fresh cucumber juice, eight ounces; oil of sweet almonds, two ounces; powdered white castile soap, one-fourth ounce; essence of cucumbers, three ounces; tincture of benzoin, twenty drops; "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC, fifty grains. Wash and slice, but do not peel, two large green cucumbers. Boil in a porcelain kettle with a scant half cup of water until the cucumbers are soft and pulpy. Cool and strain through muslin. Measure off one and one-half ounces, and add to it an equal amount of alcohol. Let stand over night. This is the cucumber essence. Next day add the powdered soap, then add eight ounces of cucumber juice, add the almond oil very slowly and, lastly, the benzoin. After shaking well for fifteen minutes, pour in the BORIC and shake for five minutes.

This makes a sort of emulsion, delightful for any irritation of the cuticle, and particularly nice for yellow, dull skin.

EXCESSIVE PERSPIRATION—Cleanse thoroughly with water and "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX solution; dry and dust armpits with "20-MULE-TEAM" VIOLET BORIC TALCUM POWDER. (See page 22.)

FLABBY SKIN — Use cold cream recipe for massage (see page 9), afterwards bathing with cold water containing a small quantity of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX.

BLACKHEADS — The most unsightly complexion ailment. The remedy is in a simple diet, avoiding fatty meats, all greasy, stimulating foods, rich pastries, an excess of sweets and strong tea or coffee. Exercise every day, and the daily bath in tepid water, in which is dissolved a sufficient quantity of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX to make it soft. Keep the avenues of elimination active by eating fresh fruit and drinking three pints of water a day. Bathe the face at night, using QUEEN of BORAX SOAP; dry without friction and apply a little "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX COLD CREAM (see previous formula).

THE BORAXO BATH OF BEAUTY



The daily bath cleans the pores, purifies the skin, quickens the circulation, stimulates the brain.

Beauty depends upon Health, and Health upon Cleanliness, hence the daily bath is the beginning and continuance of Beauty.

When water is hard, it is impossible to create a cleansing suds. The addition of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAXO (that delicious bath powder) to the bath not only makes the cleansing process more thorough, but imparts a delightful smoothness and

velvety whiteness to the skin.

BORAXO in the bath water, besides softening it and making it grateful to the skin, removes the odor of perspiration. It is a disinfectant and antiseptic; a preventive and a purifier.

The morning bath should be either tepid or cold; a quick plunge or sponge, with always a sufficient quantity of BORAXO added to the water to make it soft and cause a foaming suds. Rinse the body with a bath spray or shower, chilling the water gradually.

Then a brisk rub-down with a coarse towel; but do not rub sufficiently hard to cause an irritation, which will frequently result with delicate or sensitive skins.

The daily bath, which should not be over five minutes at the most, stimulates the circulation, improves the digestion and opens the pores; hence it should be taken quickly, with the temperature of the bathroom distinctly warm.

This is especially important to delicate women.

A Mock Milk Bath

Here is a mock milk bath that is almost as beneficial to the skin as pure milk.

Make up a dozen or more bags of cheese cloth about a foot square. Fill them with oatmeal and pure white eastile soap shaved fine, two-thirds oatmeal, one-third soap. Add a half a can "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAXO and some powdered orris root, and tie up the bag securely. One bag in twelve gallons of water makes a delightfully refreshing bath, and leaves the skin like velvet.

HOW TO HAVE SOUND, WHITE TEETH

Early neglect is the chief reason why ugly teeth are so frequently seen. From the time when the first little tooth peeks through the pink gum, the teeth should be carefully treated. The mother who is wise begins brushing her baby's teeth very gently as soon as there are enough of them to brush. Previous to that time the mouth is swabbed with a bit of clean, sterilized linen which has been dipped into a solution of "20-MULE-TEAM" POWDERED BORIC (see page 22).

Brush the teeth after each meal, and a thorough brushing before going to bed. Neglect will not only cause the teeth to decay.

but will make the gums weak and unhealthy. Twice a year tartar should be removed and cavities filled by a capable dentist. Powders containing coarse, gritty substances are extremely harmful. Do not crack nuts or bite thread with your teeth.

Brush up and down, and not crossways. The reason for this is obvious. The food lodges between the teeth, and by brushing horizontally—cross-wise—as is commonly done, the hairs jump from one tooth to the other, but fail to reach the spaces between.

Use the following pure antiseptic powder, also see that after each cleansing all powder is rinsed away. Keep your brush clean, and every week sterilize with hot BORIC solution.

Good Recipes for the Teeth

TOOTH POWDER—Prepared chalk, six ounces; powdered orris root, one ounce; white castile soap, powdered, one-half ounce; pulverized sugar, one-half ounce; "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC, one-half ounce; powdered wintergreen, one-half dram. Grind to fine powder, sift, and sift again.

Tooth Wash—Coarse powdered scap bark, one ounce; orris, coarse powder, one-fourth ounce; "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, one ounce; saccharine, five grains; oil of peppermint, one-half dram; oil of wintergreen, one-fourth dram; water, nine ounces; glycerine, one ounce; alcohol, six ounces; solution of carmine, one diam. Mix, macerate for seven days, agitating occasionally, and filter.

MOUTH-WASH — Myrrh, powder, one-half ounce; "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, one-half ounce; red saunders, one-half ounce; sugar, one-half ounce; cologne water, three ounces; alcohol, nine ounces; water, four and one-half ounces. Mix, macerate for several days with agitation, and filter.

eral days with agitation, and filter.

Have these put up by a reliable druggist, but insist on "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX or BORIC.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE NURSERY

The suggestions here given are absolutely harmless and are highly recommended by competent specialists who understand the care and treatment of infants.

In the first place, cleanliness is conducive to baby's comfort; cleanliness of garments, body and food. Every morning its precious mouth must be washed out with cool, sterilized water, to which a pinch of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC has been added.

If baby nurses, the mother's nipples must also be bathed in the same antiseptic.

Absorbent cotton should be used for the purpose, being destroyed each time, and never returned to the Boric solution.

The baby's bath is rendered cleansing, soothing and antiseptic by dissolving a little "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX in the water. Use only pure white soap (like QUEEN of BORAX) when bathing the baby. Before beginning the bath, gently flood the eyes with pure tepid water, which has been boiled or filtered. Inflammation of the eyes is very dangerous, especially when it occurs a few days after birth.

The nurse must be extremely careful when bathing the eyes.

Pure rosewater is good for the purpose, and all cloths and bits of cotton must be destroyed.

Older children, who are troubled with weak eyes or inflammation of the lids, should be treated with an eye solution made of twenty grains of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC and two fluid drams of camphor water.

The use of impure powders often causes extreme irritation, the skin of a little "just-come" baby being amazingly delicate and very susceptible to coarse particles in powder made of undesirable ingredients—therefore,

have been added. Let soak for half an hour, and no rubbing will be necessary except on the soiled spots, and even then the board will not be needed. Rinse in four waters, dry well and do not iron. Hang in the sunshine before using.

To keep the baby's milk bottle clean, "20-MULE-TEAM"

BORAX is an antiseptic of vital importance.

Select the plain bottle with a black rubber nipple (never a tube bottle). Immediately after baby has finished his meal, his bottle should be carefully rinsed with cold water, then bottle and nipple washed with soapsuds in which "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX has been dissolved. Rinse, boil in clear Borax water for twenty minutes (nipple as well as bottle) and set away in a porcelain dish filled with a "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX solution, made of one teaspoonful powdered BORAX to a quart of water.

This will keep the milk bottle absolutely clean and antiseptic.

Thrush is a disease of the mouth common in bottle fed or delicate children. Small whitish patches, sometimes crowded thickly together, form over the lining of the mouth, and especially on the tongue. Cover the finger with a moist clean cloth, and wipe away the patches very gently.

Then spray the mouth with a lotion made of one-half ounce of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC and one pint of water. Or, a small portion of this lotion can be applied with a camel's hair brush—"20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, twenty grains; tincture of myrrh, one-half fluid dram; glycerine, one fluid dram; water enough to make one fluid ounce.

If baby, during the crawling stage, meets with accident and burns his little hands, bathe at once with a solution of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC, then touch the wound with oil of peppermint (if the skin has not been broken) and bind on absorbent cotton. If the burn is a severe one, while the physician is being sent for bathe with BORIC solution. It is needful that an antiseptic be used at once. More than that, BORIC is cooling and healing.

Young babies often show excessive oily scales upon the head. These must be carefully watched and great cleanliness used. An effective ointment to be applied every night is made of one dram of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC, and half ounce each of vaseline and lanoline. Never use a fine tooth comb on these formations.

CARE OF THE EYES

For general weakness of the eyes or passing local inflammation, the following will be found invaluable. Do not hesitate to use it, for it is recommended by the best authorities.

Recipe for Weak Eyes

Take a teaspoonful of powdered "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC and place in a teacup. To this add fifteen drops of spirits of camphor, rubbing to a smooth paste. Pour over it two-thirds of a cup of distilled water. Then strain and bottle. Apply with absorbent cotton, or, better still, use a glass eye-cup.

If, after a fortnight's treatment, this wash does not give relief, you can know that the trouble is not a local one, but that some optical defect is making life miserable. In that case hesitate not a moment to consult a first-class, reliable and conscientious oculist (not an optician), and if he says glasses are needed, put them on.

The very moment that the eyeballs ache, work should be suspended, no matter how urgent or how necessary it is.

Tonics for the eyelashes must be used with consideration, as all cily applications will irritate the eyes. Witchhazel, diluted, will sometimes inspire a heavier, longer growth of the lashes, but as a general rule these hairy fringes cannot be coaxed to do very much in the growing line, especially after one has passed one's youth.

WEEPING OF THE EYES — Involuntary weeping, oftenest among the elderly, is caused by weakness of the tear glands. A simple cure for this ailment is "20-MULE-TEAM" BORIC water — a level teaspoonful to a pint of soft water. It should be used often, not too cold, dashed into and wiped into the eyes.

The following directions for washing fine, expensive blankets are reliable and satisfactory:

Select a bright, sunshiny day for the work, as it is very necessary that both the

washing and the drying processes be hurried along as rapidly as possible.

Fill a tub full of warm water. Add two large tablespoonfuls of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, add enough QUEEN of BORAX SOAP to make a good suds.

Throw a blanket in and squeeze it gently. Do not wring with the hands, and by no means should a board be used, else the fleecy surface will fluff up into hard little lumps and the blanket be ruined. Rub through the hands gently, and send through a rubber wringer into a second tub of water of the same temperature and with the borax and soap added. Each rinsing water must be of the same temperature, and even the last must contain borax and a little soap. Dry quickly in the sun. When thoroughly dry fold smoothly and place under a weight for a day or two, then wrap in clean paper (first sprinkling with "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX to keep moths away) and place in a cedar chest until time to use.

To WASH CURTAINS—If very dusty, throw into cold water and rinse out. Put into a second water and add a tablespoonful or two of "20-MULE-TEAM" BORAX, and let it soak for half an hour. To Wash Table Linen, Etc. — Make the first suds as suggested for washing blankets, only have the water warmer. To keep woolen goods in proper condition, never rub while washing or wring when clean, but squeeze and shake instead. Fruit stains can be removed by pouring boiling Borax water through the cloth before it has been wet. 
